Health Innovation

In April 2020, when Dr. Tania Sullivan approached the St. Martha's Regional Hospital Foundation about purchasing two new high-fidelity humanoid mannequins to support simulation-based learning and interprofessional practice at St. Martha's, we jumped at the opportunity.

As hospital staff and physicians entered into COVID-19 training, and the pandemic was starting to hit home, purchasing mannequins for St. Martha's Regional Hospital that would support airway training and help prepare the staff and physicians for whatever would come, seemed like a great investment for the hospital and our community. The mannequins have since been used to support ongoing COVID-19 skills training, and enhanced training for medical residents coming to St. Martha's through Dalhousie's Family Medicine Residency Program. They have also supported training at neighboring community hospitals such as Eastern Memorial Hospital, St. Mary's Hospital and Guysborough Hospital, helping medical teams in the region prepare for whatever the future may bring.

Since purchasing the two new mannequins, the Foundation has also committed an additional \$25,000 for simulation task trainers. The task trainers will provide specialized team-based training to be used in the care of patients with cardiac issues, neurological issues and trauma-based injuries. These investments will greatly enrich the healthcare team's ability to train and practice together without patient risk, while also enhancing the learning experience that St. Martha's is able to offer medical learners.

The Greatest Gift: Cardiorespiratory Care at St. Martha's

In January 2021, the cardiorespiratory team was joined by Cardiologist, Dr. Kate MacEachern. Over the coming weeks and months, St. Martha's plans to introduce four new echo programs including: stress echoes, transesophageal echoes, bubbles studies and contrast studies. In 2019, the Foundation purchased an echocardiogram machine for the Sobey Foundation Cardiorespiratory Unit. In 2020, the Foundation provided additional funding to purchase add on equipment for the echo to be able to conduct some of these new procedures.

Having a Cardiologist on staff at St. Martha's has been a game changer. Since welcoming Dr. MacEachern, St. Martha's has seen a massive upgrade to its echo capacity with these new tests.

Using the donation provided by the Sobey Foundation, St. Martha's Regional Hospital is not only able to improve patient care by providing services that they were not able to provide just 12 months ago, they have enhanced the quality of care and have allowed residents in the Quad counties to receive care closer to their home.

The winning team was Keltic Ford of Antigonish, with the MacLeod Group team narrowly

beating the St. Martha's Hospital Team for second place. We want to extend a special thank you to Boyd and Theresa MacIsaac for their ongoing support of the tournament. Your Donation Makes a Difference

Thanks to a generous donation from the Bank of Nova Scotia (BNS), Nova Scotia Health hired a **behavioral interventionist** in 2019, to support clients in Antigonish and surrounding areas. Funding for the position came through a gift agreement between the St. Martha's Regional Hospital Foundation and the BNS, which committed \$200,000 in funding over five years. Based out of St. Martha's Regional Hospital in Antigonish, the behavioral interventionist works along with the neurodevelopmental team to plan and provide home based behavioral modification and intervention to school-aged children diagnosed with neurodevelopmental disorders (e.g. autism, Asperger's, Tourette Syndrome) and/or comorbid mental health disorders. Since the program began in 2019, the behavioral interventionist program has worked with over 80 clients in our community, and has grown and adapted to best meet the needs of the community.





The Foundation was very excited to replace the **portable ultrasound machine** for the Ophthalmology Department in 2020. Widely used by the department, the ultrasound machine helps the Ophthalmologists to run tests that would otherwise have to be done in Halifax.

"The ultrasound has many uses. One example is that we often use the machine to measure the length of the eye. You can measure length using light by measuring the time it takes for a reflection to reach a sensor. In a dense cataract however, light cannot pass through, so the ultrasound uses sound waves similar to sonar to figure the length out. This value is important because it helps us calculate the lens power needed during cataract surgery. Our new machine does this and without this we would need to send these complex patients to Halifax." – Dr. Mustafa Kapasi, Ophthalmologist

Chester Chest: This piece features a standard arm with an exiting vein from the inner bicep area and a pre-positioned 20g IV catheter in the forearm. Chester Chest makes it possible to teach and practice the infusion, withdrawal, care, securement and dressings of the following vascular access lines: IVAD placed in the chest, Hickman-like central line, PICC line, IV site and optional Triple lumen jugular and subclavian catheters. It allows for ongoing education and continuous practice for all professions.





In February 2021 the Foundation was pleased to approve \$136,000 for the laboratory services department at St. Martha's to purchase new **CellaVision software.** CellaVision is an advanced piece of laboratory equipment that processes blood morphology results using high speed robotics, digital technology and remote access. Currently, abnormal blood morphology tests are referred to Halifax, which has created delays. With CellaVision, when abnormal cells are seen by St. Martha's Laboratory Technologists, the Halifax Pathologists at the QEII will be able to look at the same cells. The Pathologist in Halifax can review the cells and results, and give a differential diagnosis for the patient in real time, to better aid treatment. CellaVision will prevent delays in treatment and thus delays in diagnoses.
